

The Doane Plan

Overview

In addition to an academic major and general requirements, students must complete a set of courses designed to encourage them to develop their capacities for ongoing personal growth and adaptability. This set of courses is called the Doane Plan and is broadly based in the liberal arts and sciences. All students at the undergraduate level must complete these requirements in addition to major and elective requirements.
