355 Applied Psychology and Sociology (3)

Field experience in human services and integrative proseminar with special attention to the relationship between theory and practice; readings, discussion, and writing are used to develop reflective learning and an understanding of the field agency. Includes a three-credit internship prearranged with Career Development. *Prerequisite: Psychology 117 (or Sociology 109), Psychology 234, Cooperative Education 205 (if this is a first-time internship), one other course in psychology or sociology, or permission. (Cross-referenced with Sociology 355.)*

365 Psychology of Personality (3)

A study of human individuality from various theoretical and empirical orientations. *Prerequisite: Psychology 117 and sophomore standing, or permission.*

416 Abnormal Psychology (3)

Inquiry into abnormal behavior, its categories, causes, and treatments. *Prerequisite: Two courses in psychology and junior standing, or permission.*

421 Psychology Internship (0-4)

On-the-job experience in human services. *Prerequisite: Cooperative Education 205 or permission. (Pass/Fail)*

445 History of Psychology (3)

Study of historical events, dominant figures, and systems of thought in modern psychology. *Prerequisite: Three courses in psychology or permission. Offered alternate fall terms.*

496 Seminar: Issues in Psychology (3)

Completion of the research project which students began working on the previous semester in Psychology 352: Psychological Research. Students who successfully complete this course will be able to design and conduct studies dealing with human behavior, and to write up the results of their research in a manner consistent with the American Psychological Association Publication Manual. *Prerequisite: Psychology 352.*

Public Administration (PAD)

Assistant Professor Lambert

The public administration major is designed to prepare students for personnel and management positions in public agencies.

Requirements for the Public Administration Major:

1. Complete the following five courses: Business 212, 242; Economics 203; Political Science 101, 234.
2. Complete Public Administration 493.

212 / *Public Administration (PAD)*

3. Complete five courses chosen from the following: Business 215 (or Social Science 217), 312, 315, 341, 410, 418; Economics 204, Economics/Political Science 308; Political Science 243; Psychology/Sociology 336.
4. Complete a field examination during the senior year.

493 Public Administration Seminar (4-12)

A seminar for people who desire administrative careers in government. Students are placed in federal, state, or local agencies to work on specific research and administrative tasks. The course also involves periodic seminar meetings to discuss work experiences, present papers, and develop a term project. *Prerequisite: Senior public administration major or permission.*
